Course Description: This course covers an introduction of body structures and functions. Beginning with the chemistry of cells, tissues and membranes; followed by a more in depth study of the muscular, skeletal, central, nervous, and endocrine and respiratory systems. After successful completion of the course the student will possess a basic knowledge of Anatomy and Physiology of various organ systems of the human body, which will serve as a sound basis of more advanced Anatomy and Physiology courses. This course generally will not transfer as a first semester Anatomy and Physiology course in a Registered Nursing program; But serves as a good preparation for more advanced study. The student should consult each College on their policy on accepting transfer credit. The instructor may modify this syllabus to meet the needs of a particular Class of students.

Instructor availability: If a student wishes to consult with the instructor in private an appointment may be scheduled at a time that is mutually satisfactory to the student and instructor. I will make myself available 30 minutes before and after classes and as needed by appointment. I encourage students to make use of E-Mail for communication with the instructor and other students. Student Expectations:

- 1) Attend all classes (if the student misses more than 4 classes per semester instructor / student conference will be required)

Attendance
